Dr. Cunsolo has authored 55 articles (1 forthcoming), many in high impact journals including *Nature Climate Change* (IF: 21.722), and is a highly-cited researcher (H-Index = 20; over 1600 citations). She is the Editor of the book, *Mourning Nature*, and regularly contributes chapters to academic collections. She is also the author of numerous government reports and policy briefs, including a G7 Science Statement (2018), Coordinating Lead Author on a forthcoming Natural Resources Canada Climate Change Adaptation report (forthcoming 2019), and Lead Author on a Health Canada Climate Change and Health Assessment. She is currently a contributing author on both the IPCC AR6 Chapter 14: North America and Cross Chapter Paper 6: Polar Regions. In 2014, she released a documentary film, which she directed and collaboratively produced with the 5 Inuit communities of Nunatsiavut, on climate change impacts on Inuit lives, livelihoods, and mental health. She is currently co-producing another documentary on Inuit relationships with caribou in Labrador, directed by David Borish.
